PRESIDENT'S REPORT:



Hi Everyone:

We have nearly made it; the end of 2020! A year to remember for all the wrong reasons. Let's hope with 2020 behind us, we have the end of the Corona Virus Pandemic and life will start getting back to some form of normality.

Fortunately for us all, Victoria moved to what the Government has called COVIDSafe Summer restrictions as of Sunday, 6th December. A number of the restrictions that have been placed upon us have been eased. These major changes are:-

- Fitted face masks are now only required in a limited number of places:- on public transport, in rideshare vehicles and taxis, in some retail settings including indoor shopping centres, supermarkets, department stores and indoor markets, unless an exemption applies;
- Masks are still recommended to be worn though, indoors or outdoors, when distancing can't be maintained and must be carried with you at all times.

Further easing of restrictions include:

- Private indoor gatherings: households can host up to 30 guests each day.
- Public outdoor gatherings: up to 100 people can gather outdoors from any number of households.
- Hospitality venues: The number of patrons has increased. The numbers allowed vary on the size of the venue. Standing service will resume.
- Gyms: (This will definitely affect us all...) Classes limited to 50 indoors and 100 outdoors.
- Indoor religious gatherings and ceremonies, including weddings and funerals:- no limits on the number of guests or attendees. Must be able to ensure people can keep 1.5 metres distance and a new density limit of 1 person per 2sq metres applies. Dancefloors at weddings will be able to host up to 50 people, with a density limit of 1 person per 4sqm.
- Retail and beauty services: businesses will be able to move to 1 person per 2sq metres if they introduce electronic record keeping. For businesses where that's not possible, the existing density limits will continue to apply.


This is all good news and a number of our members have already taken advantage of the easing of the restrictions and joining our club runs.

PRESIDENT'S REPORT (Continued)

What I am asking everyone to do is to please give your club permit vehicle a thorough safety check before you venture out. If you are like me, my car has been safely tucked away for an extended period of time through the pandemic. Besides oil, brakes and lights tyres also need to be checked. Unfortunately, we cannot rely on tread depth to determine when to replace a tyre or not. Old tyres can be dangerous, regardless of whether they have a good tread depth. While there's no federally sanctioned safety guidance on when a tyre is too old to be safe, many experts recommend replacement at six years from the date of manufacture. Even though a tyre still may have plenty of tread, rubber deteriorates and cracks with age and therefore it becomes dangerous to drive on them.

To determine the age of a tyre you need to check the tyre sidewall. Tyres made after the year 2000 have a four-digit "DOT" code. The first two numbers represent the week in which the tyre was made. The second two represent the year. A tyre with a "DOT" code of 1619 was made in the 16th week of 2019.

Tyres made before 2000 have a three-digit code. The first two digits still indicate the week, but the third digit tells you the year in the decade that the tyre was created. It gets a bit tricky to decode though. Some tyres made in the 1990s (but not all) have a triangle after the "DOT" code, denoting that decade. But for tyres without that, a code of "259" could be from the 25th week of 1989 - or 1979. To be honest, this doesn't really matter. If you see a "DOT" number ending in three digits, the tyre was made in the last century and needs to be replaced as soon as possible.



This tyre has a date code of 3909. This means it was manufactured on the 39th week of 2009.

Everyone has probably noticed that our annual Christmas function was missing from our runs calendar. It was not something that was decided lightly by the committee and was the topic of lengthy discussions. With the ever-changing restrictions that we have been experiencing, and businesses not prepared to take bookings, a decision was made at our last committee meeting to postpone our festivities and come together as a club and celebrate on <u>Australia Day</u> in <u>January</u> when we hopefully will be back to some sort of normality. So pencil the day in your diary and hope to see you there.

All that being said, I look forward to and hope to be able to catch up with as many of you as I can on an up and coming run.

Also a big thank you to the committee for keeping things ticking over so well through the strange times 2020 presented to us and finally on behalf of the committee I would like to wish everyone a Safe, Happy, Healthy and Prosperous Christmas and New Year.

ASSOCIATION OF MOTORING CLUBS (A.O.M.C.) ISSUES AND ACTIONS

The Association are currently addressing issues on our behalf......

- Support the Development and Retention of the permit scheme for historic vehicles;
- Lobby against the introduction of annual roadworthy inspections;

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- Lobby against any legislation that introduces compulsory removal of older vehicles from the road;
- Support Retention of the left-hand drive registration scheme for classic, historic vehicles;
- Lobby for the introduction of Australian standards for fuels suitable for the historic fleet;
- Carry out a watching brief for any State or Federal legislation that may affect the ability of the historic vehicle movement to continue to use their vehicles on the roads and highways;
- Continue to monitor the historic vehicle movement to ensure that it operates in a manner that is not considered anti-social by the wider community and that attention is paid to changing community environmental standards;
- Provide relevant advice to clubs on matters that have state wide ramifications;
- Provide forums for discussions and training for club officials on matters of common interest;
- Assist with the recording of information relating to the part played in the history of the State by the historical vehicle fleet;
- Assist clubs with promotion of the member clubs and of the historic vehicle movement;
- Provide assistance or support with the establishment and promotion of events of state-wide significance that showcase the historic vehicle movement;

A.O.M.C. - KEEPING OUR CLUB INFORMED

Colac Collectable Car Club is a member of the Association of Motoring Clubs Inc. (A.O.M.C.). The Minutes of the 2020 Association Annual General meeting, held on Monday 23rd November 2020, are published for your information. The Association works tirelessly for the old vehicle movement.

Presidents Report: Iain Ross noted that this has been a very different and difficult year for all. AOMC and club activities have been severely curtailed. We were lucky to be able to run the British and European Show in February before restrictions came into force, and the only face to face delegates meeting able to be held was way back in February. The AOMC have been unable to hold the usual seminars, National Motoring Heritage Day event or face to face delegates or committee meetings since. The Engine Number Records service has been curtailed and Howard Billing (AOMC Office Administrator) is currently working from home. We are looking forward to being able to hold meetings and run our shows and seminars again when the situation allows. Covid has bought some interesting things to the movement, and clubs have responded well, holding virtual meetings and garage sessions.

The worldwide environmental movement, which is seeing countries introduce bans on the sale of new fossil fuelled vehicles from as early as 2030, may mean our vehicles and our use of them may be in danger. Five of our current committee members are retiring from their roles tonight, Martyn Bishop, Colin Jenkins, Bryan Langton, David Andreassen and Steve Young. Iain thanked them for the work they have put into the Association over the years they have been involved.

<u>Treasurers Report</u>: Angelo D'Ambrosio also noted that this has been a challenging year for the AOMC and clubs. AOMC has returned a small surplus of \$20,000 for the financial year ending June 30, 2020. The AOMC cash balance as at 30.6.2020 was \$190,000. The balance sheet has looked okay due to cost cutting measures. The accounts have been fully audited and a copy of the full final accounts are available for viewing if requested. The treasurer's report was accepted on a motion moved by Angelo D'Ambrosio (Torana CC), seconded Colin Jenkins (Triumph CC) and carried.

<u>Subscription Fees for 2021/22</u>. Angelo reported that invoices for the 2020/21 year were held back and have only recently been sent out with a discount. He proposed that the fees for 2021/22 remain the same as the prediscounted 2020/21 fees.

It was moved Iain Ross (VDC), seconded Andrew McDougall (Alvis CC) that the membership subscription fees be maintained at the pre-discount amounts for 2020/21. Motion was carried.

<u>Auditor</u>: It was moved Angelo D'Ambrosio (Torana CC), seconded David Smallcombe (Morris Register) that the current auditor, Stephen Barker be reappointed for 2020/21. Motion was carried.

Election of Office Bearers for 2020/21.

Daryl Meek (Veteran CC) took the chair to conduct the elections. On behalf of the clubs and the movement in general, Daryl thanked Iain and his team for all of their work during the difficult Covid times. Also great thanks to Howard Billing for his work in the AOMC office. Daryl also noted that he has been surprised to have seen some of the more traditional, older clubs taking to zoom and other electronic formats during the Covid lockdown. Daryl referred to the recent FBHVC survey of the historic movement in the UK. In 2015 the results were an estimated worth to the UK economy of £5.5 billion. Daryl used this data at the time to compare to the Victorian movement and estimated a net worth in Victoria of approximately \$860million. The 2020 FBHVC survey showed an increased value of £7.2 billion to the UK economy to be approximately \$1.2 billion. This highlights the need for effective peak body representation to reflect the importance of the movement to Victoria. As per the rules of the Association, all committee positions are declared vacant and nominations were called from the floor. Members can nominate themselves or be nominated by another delegate. The rules allow for 4 executive positions, President, Vice President, Treasurer and Secretary. They also allow for a range of 7 to 9 general committee members in addition to these executive positions to be determined at the Annual General Meeting.

It was moved Keith Mortimer (Jaguar CC) seconded Andrew McDougal (Alvis CC) that the general committee consist of up to 9 members for 2020/21.

As there were no further nominations, Daryl announced that the above be duly elected for the year 2020/21. Iain Ross resumed the chair and then produced a presentation plaque from the AOMC and Clubs to be presented to Daryl Meek in recognition of his untiring work for the movement when with the RACV as Motoring Interests manager. Daryl responded that it is a shame that a program that has been 20 years in the making has suddenly come to a halt. RACV have indicated that they will still provide support to the movement.

Iain reported that he has had discussions with the RACV and pointed out to them that the new system of grants will disadvantage clubs. Iain also noted that AOMC is still looking for representation from the American Vehicle field on the committee. Iain also reported that he has been approached by the Dept of Transport regarding starting discussions on a revision of the CPS. Conferencing to begin later this week. He also noted that the U.K. government have announced that they are barring the sales of new internal combustion engine vehicles from 2030.

Events: Clubs are looking patiently to organising events and meetings in the near future. All reliant on levels of restrictions, but we seem to be heading in the right direction. The AOMC has at present cancelled the British and European Show scheduled for February 2021, but will look at the situation after Christmas and maybe run it late in February.

Chairman Iain Ross announced that the Annual General Meeting for 2020 closed, and that the next Annual General Meeting of the Association will take place on Monday, 22nd November, 2021. Iain then asked for Delegates to give any reports or updates.

DELEGATES REPORTS.

Len Kerwood (Austin 7): Len announced a change of date for next year's Winton event. The V8 supercars have again taken the traditional date that Historic Winton is held, so it has been changed to the weekend of 22 and 23 May 2021. Len also asked if we had any links with heritage groups or the National Trust so that our vehicles can be properly recognised as historic. Daryl Meek responded that there are currently some semi-formal links. **Andrew McDougal (Alvis CC & Veteran CC):** FIVA have recently circulated 2 surveys. One is based around individual members and this survey has closed. The second one is based on clubs and is open for responses until December 15th. Andrew stressed that it is extremely important that clubs respond to the survey. All information gathered in Australia will be available for use in Australia, which would be very useful when lobbying government bodies. There will also be a third survey which will be based on money spent on service / parts / rallies / accommodation / etc.

The Alvis National rally has been planned to take place in Victoria in April 2021 and to be based in Hamilton. They are still hoping to be able to run it in April.

Keith Taylor (Chev CC): If the Department of Transport change the Club Plate Scheme eligibility from 25 years to 30 years, can we push them for a rolling change.

Rick Cove (EGHVC): announced that the Maffra Shed is open again.

Harry Duynhoven (NZ Federation of Motoring Clubs): In New Zealand, all clubs were asked to put on spontaneous events in the weekend after lockdown finished and raised money for charities.

John Johnson (Volvo CC): asked if there is any news on the Berwick Swap, is it going ahead? There were several conflicting responses, with some delegates having heard it was cancelled and some that it was going ahead. Howard Billing checked the website which states it is still taking place.

A.O.M.C. - KEEPING OUR CLUB INFORMED

Philip Johnstone (Triumph Sports Owners): The Engine Number Records service is almost back to full service. Philip has been busy clearing the backlog of requests received during Covid lockdown, which could not be processed as he could not attend the storage facility as it meant travelling more than the 5km allowed. There have been plenty of searches for Monaro's, Torana's, GT Falcons, Honda motorbikes and Land Rovers. The AOMC has the Springs Specification records now stored with the Engine Number Records. Philip has been sorting through them, and they are now ordered and he is starting to list them. The records run from 1923 to the 1970s and cover all imaginable vehicles. Iain Ross thanked Philip for all his work on this service.

Tony Hall (Nissan Datsun Sports Owners): Club events did not decrease this year, as they held virtual cars and coffee events with up to 40 attendees. They have been so successful that the club plans to continue with these virtual events post Covid.

Wendy McIntyre-Leak (Sun Country Historical Vehicle and Machinery Club): Club has been holding small events since October based on the numbers allowed. Being regional they had less restrictions than Melbourne based clubs. At present, hospitality venues can host more people than an outdoor event. Need to record attendee's for any contact tracing that may be required.

Keith Mortimer (Jaguar CC): All clubs should have a Covid safe plan, including recording names for contact tracing.

John Johnson (Volvo CC): No more news on an American car Show? Iain Ross responded that AOMC are still searching for an appropriate venue that Shannon's the major sponsor are happy with.

Len Kerwood (Austin 7): noted that his club is classed as a sporting club so they need to draft their Covid plan differently.

Iain Ross thanked all for taking the effort of attending this evening and declared the meeting closed at 8.40pm.

STAR AND CAR: ATHOL GUY



Bass guitarist of the Seekers dreams of his old GTHO.

Born in Colac, Victoria, Athol Guy is best known as the bespectacled double-bass player for '60s folkinfluenced group the Seekers – the first Australian group to achieve major chart and sales success in Britain and the United States.

Athol's Career highlights: Along with the rest of the Seekers, Top 10 hits including "I'll Never Find Another You", "A World of our Own" and "Georgy Girl"; being named as joint Australians of the Year in 1968; being inducted into the ARIA Hall of Fame in 1995.

Other memorable moments: hosting his own variety series, A Guy Called Athol, on the Seven Network; being elected as Liberal member for Gisborne in the Victorian Legislative Assembly in 1971.

Tell us about your first car:

It was a little Morris 840 when I was 18. A little soft-top tourer. It was a great little buzz-around, when I got my licence and was able to buy a car. I did have a bit of a calamity with it after I'd been off singing at a function one night. Coming down a hill on Punt Road in Melbourne it suddenly started to slow down quite dramatically and ground to a halt. I'd simply forgotten to put oil in the engine.

How did your car situation evolve when you first went to England with the group?

I'll never forget we were playing in Bournemouth in the very, very early days. I looked into one of the big car display places. I couldn't afford it and I didn't end up getting it, but there was this beautiful red Austin Healey. However, the moment we started getting work and things improved, the boys and I were able to buy a car each. Independently without knowing it, we all ended up with a beautiful XK150 Jaguar.

Tell us about finding the best car you ever owned:

Not long after I was walking past a showroom in South Kensington and there was the best-looking deep purple-blue Aston Martin DB5 that you had ever seen. I bought it – love at first sight. It had done 5000 miles and a mate of mine ran the showroom and he cut me an incredible deal. I bought it for 2500 quid. Absolutely magnificent. Everywhere I parked the car in London, people would stop and look at it.

Didn't you also have a classic muscle car in the stable at one point?

When I came back to Australia I ended up with a new GTHO Falcon, an unbelievable black beast. I had it when I went into Parliament in 1971 - 1972. A few of my more conservative constituents thought it was a bit hoonish! I ended up selling it to a friend. Two-weeks later he wrapped it around a lamp-post – end of story, end of car. Absolutely pulverised it. That made me sadder than having sold it.



The Century Royal is considered the flagship model and one of the rarest Toyota cars ever and it is very rare that you will ever see one outside of Japan. The car which has been in production from 1967 has seen only 3 generations. The car is powered by a V8 engine that produces 375 horsepower and an electric engine that brings the total output to 425 horsepower. This car is only used by the family royals or Japanese diplomats abroad.

Ford Thunderbird Convertible: John F. Kennedy

JFK owned a 1961 Ford Thunderbird convertible third generation. This car is known as the 'bullet bird' as the new design of the front of the vehicle had been completely reshaped and made pointier. It was a quite powerful model as it was powered by a 6.4-litre V8 that produced over 300 horsepower. The same model was also used in 1961 as the Pace Car for the Indy 500. President Kennedy loved this car so much that for his inauguration parade he used 50 identical Thunderbirds made specifically for that day.

Jeep CJ-8 Scrambler: Ronald Reagan

An absolutely iconic car that was a present from his wife, Nancy, and it was used as a shuttle around the president's ranch. It has also been used to carry visiting dignitaries such as Mikhail Gorbachev. The car which was painted in a rather unique blue was a true off-road beast and it was powered by a four-cylinder engine that produced just 82 horsepower.

Cadillac One: US President Donald Trump

As the name suggests this is the one, the ultimate Cadillac. It is basically a tank in disguise and as a matter of fact it is referred to as 'the beast.' The windows of the car are made of 5 layers of glass and polycarbonate, making them bullet-proof and virtually indestructible. The tyres are shred and puncture-resistant and the doors are reinforced with steel plates that can easily sustain an explosion blast. Also, in order to prevent any fire, the gas tank is filled with a special foam that prevents it from catching fire even when directly hit. According to an NBC report, the Cadillac weighs an incredible 20,000 pounds.

Corvette Stingray C2: Joe Biden

The beautiful 1967 C2 is just one of the many examples that shows how much Joe Biden loves Corvettes. The Stingray is one of the most beautiful cars ever produced and it was a wedding present from his father. The C2 was and still is a beautiful beast as it is powered by an L79 V8 engine that generates a fantastic 350 horsepower and can push the car from 0 to 60 mph in just 5.8 seconds. This model is one of the most iconic cars ever built by Chevrolet thanks to its unique design.

Citroen DS19: Charles De Gaulle

This car was known as 'La Deesse', the goddess, as it is credited to have saved the life of De Gaulle during an assassination attempt in 1962. The car was first presented in 1955 and it had a 1.9-litre engine and was equipped with a rather unique hydro-pneumatic suspension. The system was equipped with shock absorbers that allowed the car suspensions to adjust its height and firmness depending on the load weight and the road type. Thanks to this advanced system, when all four tyres were punctured by the bullets during the assassination attempt, the car was still drivable as the suspension kept it stable, allowing the driver to maintain control of the vehicle and speed up away.
