REGISTER OF CLUB PERMIT CARS WITH COLAC COLLECTABLE CAR CLUB INC.

Colac Collectable Car Club regularly compares our Club Vehicle Register with that of VicRoads.

We would like to remind all Members that it is important that you let us know if a Club Permit car, registered with our Club is sold or any changes have been made with the permit. If sold, then we need to remove it from the Register. It is our members responsibility to attend VicRoads to advise of the disposal so they also remove the vehicle or motorcycle etc. from their records.

Any new vehicles or motorcycles purchased by our members, that are to be put on Club Permit via Colac Collectable Car Club Inc. must be entered onto our Vehicle Register. We suggest you do not to get the Roadworthy until you are about to place the vehicle or motorcycle onto the VicRoads Club Permit Scheme. A reminder also that Permit Scheme Officers are not authorized to sign paperwork for new vehicles, they can only sign annual Club Permit renewals. See the Club Contact list in this newsletter for details of our Club Safety Officers and Scrutineers and Permit Scheme Officers.

The Club is also required to ... "Maintain a register of dated photographs for all vehicles for which a new Club Permit is sought. Photographs must include images of the front, driver's side, rear, driving position (side on with the driver's door open) and, where possible, any identifiers such as chassis, VIN and engine number. Where a Club Permit application for a motor cycle is made, the club must take photographs of both sides of the motorcycle, and of the rear, and where possible, of identifiers such as chassis, VIN and engine numbers. Clubs are required to provide photographs to VicRoads within seven days of receipt of a written request from Vic-Roads."



This is the 2022 Logo from AC Cars however, the company dates back many years.

AC Cars, originally incorporated as **Auto Carriers Ltd.**, is a British specialist automobile manufacturer and one of the oldest independent car makers founded in Britain. As a result of bad financial conditions over the years, the company was renamed or liquidated many times until its present form.

In 2022, the new corporate structure began the production of new AC Cobra models, with a slightly modified structure to adapt it to modern safety and technology requirements and obtain the European road homologation certificate

The first car from the company that eventually became AC was presented at the Crystal Palace motor show in 1903; it was a 20 HP touring car and was displayed under the Weller name.

The Weller brothers of West Norwood, London, planned to produce an advanced 20 hp (15 kW) car.

However, their financial backer and business manager John Portwine, a butcher, thought the car would be too expensive to produce and encouraged Weller to design and produce a little delivery three-wheeler.

In 1904, a new company was founded and named Autocars and Accessories; production started with the Auto-Carrier. The vehicle caught on quickly and was a financial success. Three years later, a passenger version appeared, called the A.C. Sociable. It had a seat in place of the cargo box.

The A.C. Sociable was described in a review of the 1912 Motor Cycle and Cycle Car Show as "one of the most popular cycle cars on the road, both for pleasure and business", and A.C. displayed eight vehicles on their stand, six for pleasure and two for business.^[3] The single rear wheel contained a two-speed hub, and the single-cylinder engine was mounted just in front of it, with rear chain drive

The company became Auto Carriers Ltd. in 1911 and moved to Ferry Works, Thames Ditton, Surrey — at this time, they also began using the famed "AC" roundel logo. They continued to produce the commercial 3-wheeler tricars and the A.C. Sociable now frequently referred to in their adverts as the Mighty Atom. Their first four-wheeled car was produced in 1913; it was a sporty two-seater with a gearbox on the rear axle. Only a few were built before production was interrupted by the First World War. During the First World War, the Ferry Works factory produced shells and fuses for the war effort, although at least one vehicle was designed and built for the War Office.

At the end of the war, Auto Carriers started making motor vehicles again, designing and building many successful cars at Ferry Works, as well as expanding into an old balloon factory on Thames Ditton High Street. Shortly thereafter, John Weller started on the design of a new overhead-cam six-cylinder engine. The first versions of this design were running by 1919. The Weller engine would be produced until 1963.





The Furphy Museum is a dedicated area at the Museum of Vehicle Evolution (MOVE) showcasing the history of the iconic family businesses Furphy & Sons and Furphy Foundry and their evolution through to the modern era. From famous water carts and camp ovens, through two world wars, to the modern engineering and manufacturing businesses that still operate in Shepparton and beyond today. It's a story full of characters, hard work, ingenuity and maybe even a tall tale or two.

Thank you to club member Shane Perrott for this contribution to our Club Newsletter :-

I attended the 150 years of J Furphy & Sons celebration at the MOVE Museum Shepparton on Saturday, 25th November with my family.

During the day there was an exhibition of Furphy Water Carts. As this was an invitation only event, (I work at Geelong Galvanizing which is owned by J Furphy & sons) we enjoyed a dinner on the Saturday night. To commemorate 150 years, J Furphy cast 15 tank ends with I going to the Shepparton council, others to winners of a display, and one was auctioned on the night. The auction raised \$50,000 with monies going towards the local Lift Off Scholarship program. This program is to assist young people from the community to make that next step to post-secondary education. Furphy Water Carts are well known in history with the term a Furphy coming from soldiers during World War 1. This was a great event to celebrate an Australian icon.







The MOVE Museum is well worth a visit.

HAVE YOU EVER WONDERED......

1.. WHY? Do men's clothes have buttons on the right while women's clothes have buttons on the left?

When buttons were invented, they were very expensive and worn primarily by the rich. Since most people are right-handed, it is easier to push buttons on the right through holes on the left. Because wealthy women were dressed by maids, dressmakers put the buttons on the maid's right! And that's where women's buttons have remained since.

3.. WHY? Why are zero scores in tennis called 'love'?

In France, where tennis first became popular, the round zero on the scoreboard looked like an egg and was called 'l'oeuf,' which is French for 'the egg.' When tennis was introduced in the US, Americans, mispronounced it 'love.'

4.. WHY? Why do X's at the end of a letter signify kisses?

In the Middle Ages, when many people were unable to read or write, documents were often signed using an X. Kissing the X represented an oath to fulfill obligations specified in the document. The X and the kiss eventually became synonymous.

5.. WHY? Why is shifting responsibility to someone else called 'passing the buck'

In card games, it was once customary to pass an item, called a buck, from player to player to indicate whose turn it was to deal. If a player did not wish to assume the responsibility of dealing, he would 'pass the buck' to the next player.

6.. WHY? Why do people clink their glasses before drinking a toast?

In earlier times it used to be common for someone to try to kill an enemy by offering him a poisoned drink. To prove to a guest that a drink was safe, it became customary for a guest to pour a small amount of his drink into the glass of the host. Both men would drink it simultaneously. When a guest trusted his host, he would only touch or clink the host's glass with his own.

7.. WHY? Why are people in the public eye said to be 'in the limelight'?

Invented in 1825, limelight was used in lighthouses and theatres by burning a cylinder of lime which produced a brilliant light. In the theatre, a performer 'in the limelight' was the Centre of attention.

8.. WHY? Why is someone who is feeling great 'on cloud nine'?

Types of clouds are numbered according to the altitudes they attain, with nine being the highest cloud. If someone is said to be on cloud nine, that person is floating well above worldly cares.

9.. WHY? In golf, where did the term 'Caddie' come from?

When Mary Queen of Scots went to France as a young girl, Louis, King of France, learned that she loved the Scots game 'golf.' He had the first course outside of Scotland built for her enjoyment. To make sure she was properly chaperoned (and guarded) while she played, Louis hired cadets from a military school to accompany her.

Mary liked this a lot and when she returned to Scotland (not a very good idea in the long run), she took the practice with her. In French, the word cadet is pronounced 'ca-day' and the Scots changed it into caddie.

10 ... WHY? Why are many coin collection jar banks shaped like pigs?

Long ago, dishes and cookware in Europe were made of dense orange clay called 'pygg'. When people saved coins in jars made of this clay, the jars became known as 'pygg banks.' When an English potter misunderstood the word, he made a container that resembled a pig. And it caught on.
